## REGISTRATION FOR 2019-2020

Tuition letters will be sent home to all our families the week of April 29. These letters will also indicate scholarship awards for those families who are eligible for tuition assistance. Applications for financial assistance were due to FACTS this week.

Registration deposits (\$125 for those paying monthly and \$75 for those making one or two payments) along with contracts

will be due back by Friday, May 10. Deposits are not refundable and they are not to be deducted from the total tuition. [Contracts must be signed in order to reenroll your children for the next school year.](#)

## SAFE ENVIRONMENT

All volunteers, including parents, are required to comply with the school's request for a Vulnerable Record Check for the safety of our children. This is in accordance with Diocesan policies and is required for anyone who wishes to work with our students in any capacity. Fingerprinting is not necessary for this background check.

In addition, all staff members, coaches, and volunteers (new and old) who work directly with children (including field trip chaperones,

lunch room helpers, etc.) must complete a new on-line program called "VIRTUS." If your "Safe and Sacred" certificate has expired, you will need to complete the new program right away and all others need to have it done before they can volunteer or be a chaperone for events. Don't delay!

The "Safe and Sacred" program previously used will no longer be accessible or valid.

## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

We live in a world that appears increasingly materialistic and selfish. As followers of Jesus, we often struggle with this reality. Jesus told us that "I have not come to be served, but to serve." On a very hopeful note, many children today are able to see clearly the overemphasis on material things in our world and are determined and ready to do something to change that. Social researchers call the children in today's elementary and high schools a "hero generation." We see evidence of this in many programs that young people have started in their schools and communities to meet the needs of the poor and needy. Today's young people are committed to making our world a cleaner and more just world in which to live.

As technology brings the world closer together, it becomes clearer that all human beings rely on one another in countless ways. It is our charge to work together to do all that we can to make our world a better place. The kinds of changes necessary to do this are both grand and small in scale. What can you do to teach your child the importance of service to others?

- Model reverence for all of creation.
- Show compassion for those who are less fortunate or in need.
- Consider a family service activity such as working in a soup kitchen with your child, helping a neighbor with yard work, or working with Habitat for Humanity.
- Encourage your child to be generous in helping at school either through clubs or whenever there is need.
- Summer may be a great time to undertake a new service activity with your family.
- Most importantly, lead by example.

The path of service is rewarding one. Do what you can to encourage this belief and practice in your family.
