From the Principal

There is real "value" in practicing certain time-honored values. Throughout this school year we will take a look at six character traits, why they are worth practicing, and what you can do to help develop them in your child.

Our first is the value of patience. Do you remember when you had to quietly wait your turn for an ice cream cone when the ice cream truck came to your neighborhood? Or when you had to go to several stores to find just the right birthday gift for a friend? Today many of our tasks and errands take only a few minutes, thanks to modern technology and time saving inventions. This progress, however, has created a desire for instant gratification, and with that, a loss of patience.

At the same time, research has found that the capacity to exercise patience and self-control correlates with higher selfesteem, better grades, and better interpersonal skills. How can you help your child learn patience?

- Start small, start short: Give your children many chances to practice waiting.
- Teach self-control: Treat your children as if they can

control themselves and let them know, in a calm manner, that this is the behavior you expect.

- Create purposeful delays: Slow down your response time to your children's requests and demands. They will learn that they can wait for things that matter.
- Take turns: Teach your children to wait for others. This skill will serve them well in life.

Practicing patience in your home will benefit your child and your family for many years to come.
