FROM THE PRINCIPAL

"Pray always," Jesus said (Luke 21:36). But our lives are filled with activity. There is never enough time. We find ourselves "saying prayers" rather than praying. True contact with God in prayer requires lifting the heart and mind to Him. Our children need to learn the real joy and peace that prayer can bring. What, then, can we do? And when is a better

time to do it than the approaching Advent season.

As always, the best teaching—in your home as in school—is done by example. Share periods of silence with your child, silence that will give you both a chance to listen to God. Open your hearts and minds to His presence. Let Him lead you to a deeper awareness of His love. Time

spent with Him is priority time. Setting the alarm a bit earlier can give your family a chance to be together to join in asking God's blessing for the day and filling your hearts with His love.

A short time each evening reading from the lives of the saints can introduce children to the special friends of God, better models to follow than many of today's "stars." The sense of community with those who have responded to the love God offers so bountifully will strengthen us, Our trust in God will grow, and we will find it easier to talk "with" rather than "at" God as we pray.

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
